



You are invited to join Square Watch!

To form a neighborhood watch here, the Santa Ana Police Deptartment requires at least 10 neighbors who agree to organize to observe and report suspicious activity. At the initial exploratory meeting announced on Facebook and emails, there were 26!

WOW. Twenty six neighbors showed up and about five more wanted to be there but couldn't! That's incredible! SquareWatch is off to a very strong start! Obviously, none of us likes crime much.

If you are interested in participating, please send a Facebook message to Martin van der Roest or email newsletter@ washington-square.org. Susan van der Roest is coordinating the training with SAPD. Make sure your contact information is correct and you will be added to the list and informed of any activities or opportunities.

Training Date and Time TBD Volunteer Job Description:

There will be a formal training which will be announced soon. Deputy Chief Ken Gominsky attended the exploratory meeting and presented the basic expectations of our volunteers. First what is NOT expected is patrolling, direct confrontation of suspects, or other dangerous activities--leave that to the professionals! What is expected of volunteers is to have eyes, ears, noses out for suspicious activities--then report it. You can post on Facebook and call the non-emergency police number unless it's a viable emergency. (See below for examples.)

What are you looking, listening, smelling for? Well, that's what we'll learn at the training, along with tips on--as Deputy Chief Gominsky says "How to target harden" our homes, and more.



Be 911 Savvy--What to call about and what NOT to call about

Examples of emergency calls:

- "My house is on fire."
- "A man has been shot."
- "A woman is threatening to jump off a bridge."
- "My son is injured and I can't stop the bleeding."
- "I think I am having a heart attack."
- "A suspicious guy is entering my neighbor's house."
- "Someone with a gun is robbing a store."
- "I think I see a drunk driver on the road."

Examples of NOT an emergency:

- "Was that an earthquake?"
- "I scraped my knee."
- "My car was towed. How do I get it back?"
- "What's the best way to the hospital?"
- "There's a truck parked in front of my house."
- "My neighbors are having a loud party"
- "My son's bicycle was stolen"
- "Is there a Starbucks nearby?

The Spring Selling Season is in full bloom right now. As you see from the above, there is very little on the market, and nearly everything in Orange County is this price range has multiple offers. We are definitely in a Seller's Market. Historically, sales begin to slow down in the summer months, so if you have been thinking of selling, from now through May will be your optimum opportunity.

There have been, homes recently sold to investors at below market value price. Generally the sellers are in distress and investor swoop in with a cash offer. However, demand is so strong, as long as the homes are in reasonable condition, there are plenty of "real" potential homeowners who are looking to buy. The problem with selling low is that future comps are affected for the whole neighborhood. Sellers have difficulty getting a reasonable sales price because the appraisals come in low because of the previous low price sales. A 911 How To:

Hopefully you will never have to, and most people will call 911 only once or twice during their lifetimes. Having the necessary

information will help the 911 operator in sending you the appropriate help quickly. It can

be a frightening experience, but there are several precautions that you can take to make the process run smoothly for you and the operator.

First STAY CALM. Breathe and first...

Find a phone!

Preferably a land line unless it's a fire or burglary. This will help determine your location. If it's a fire, don't stay in the building, get out first! Wireless phones are usually routed to the local police department but are not always accurate if you are near the border of two cities or a freeway. Keep this in mind if you are using a wireless phone to call 911.

Dial 911.

Be aware that, sometimes, it takes time for the phone to route to the correct answering point. Do NOT hang up if you do not connect immediately!!

Have you started planning your summer trips? Save the date for our annual children's Vacation Bible School held evenings on July 13th through July 17th for children and volunteers. It's always a fun time for all who participate.

We hope you will join us this Sunday!

Do not panic.

This is easier said than done. Panic does not help. Instead, begin to plan what you will say to the dispatcher. Remember: Panic is the enemy, in this race against time. Remain calm. Keep breathing!

Know what you will be asked. Make sure that you are aware of each of the following:

Where is the emergency?: The emergency is not always located where you are calling from. Always be aware of your surroundings and where you are. Try to keep a watch out for the road signs, business names and intersections whenever you may travel.

Nature of the emergency: Do you require assistance from law enforcement, medical professionals, and/or fire fighters? In certain areas, the dispatcher or a computer will tell you to dial certain numbers to help them know which department to connect you with and whom you should talk to.

A detailed, yet concise, description: What happened? How many details do you know? What should have the most importance? In general, the most important thing is why you need assistance (a gunshot wound, for example), followed by what caused you to need assistance (say, a school shooting).

The phone number of your phone. The dispatcher will need instructions on how to get to where you are, and may need to call back for more information. Know the phone number of your phone.

Location. Give the dispatcher your name and address

Additional general guidelines:

Listen to the dispatcher. Follow orders. The better and faster you follow orders, the higher everyone's rate of survival will be. Even in a non-lethal situation (broken bones, etc.) this is of vital importance. *Have strict, unwavering faith in the dispatcher.* And remember that even if the dispatcher is still asking questions or giving instructions, help is on the way.

Do not hang up until instructed to. Anything can happen, and the emergency services need to know your situation at all times. If the building is on fire, for example, the dispatcher will need to know if there are other people in the building and where any safe exits are. The First Responders will need as much information as possible.



Santa Ana's Modified Landscape Policies

You may have heard something about this and this article bears repeating from last issue since the drought is still with us. Be aware there has been a lot of misinformation out there about drought tolerant landscape rebates. If you want to qualify for a rebate, you MUST work with the Planning Department, get a permit, and follow regulations.

Here's a few abbreviated guidelines: At least 65% of the site must be covered with plant material. Permeable hardscape (no cement) may cover no more than 35%. Permeable hardscape adjacent to approved driveways shall NOT be used for parking of vehicles...and there's more.

We have two resources in the neighborhood who specialize in drought tolerant landscape needs. Reginald Durant who is the Executive Director of Back To Natives Restoration. He and his partner, Lori, have a lot of resources and knowledge onthe subject.

Another resource is Jeff McKee of Mora Landscaping, also experienced in plantings, maintenance and irrigation needs when going the water-wise route.
