President's Message

I chose to live in Washington Square because I love the beautiful custom homes, the tree lined streets and the charm of the neighborhood. In short, I love the small town feel. But I write this message for the first time with much disappointment. After years of coordinating and fundraising for permanent trash cans and working diligently on preserving the neighborhood, we realized the magnitude of our efforts. There was a strong sense of accomplishment among the board. But now the real work has begun as members of the board are now watching the trash cans daily and working hard to keep them free of graffiti, stickers, and paint. We are also being plagued with shopping carts being left on our streets. I have been on the association board for over 8 years. This year has been the most rewarding and the most disappointing. I believe that many of our own neighbors are contributing to these and other issues. There are a handful of people who stay regularly involved. But we can not keep up. We have other responsibilities and the association is purely voluntary. The bottom line is the board can not do it all. We need more help. If this continues, we will all suffer as our property values decline and good neighbors move away. I invite each and every one of you to pitch in and help. It can be as simple as picking up trash or reporting graffiti. You may politely remind your neighbor when you see them hauling their groceries in a shopping cart that the neighborhood will not be so attractive if they continue that practice. Or, join the board. There are about 590 occupying owners in our neighborhood. Only 7 are active board members. Any little bit of help will preserve Washington Square as we know it. It can continue to be a great place to live. We can be passive and allow the decline of our neighborhood to simply occur, or we can be proactive. I challenge all of you to start participating today. Let's take back the neighborhood, maintain our properties and preserve the neighborhood so everyone can enjoy the beauty of Washington Square..

Calling For Volunteers

Have you noticed that the last few newsletters have mentioned issues of blight in our neighborhood? Naturally, I'm the editor. So I have. Oh, the tone has been amiable but the message has been clear. To those who have called in shopping carts, etc. we thank you. I share the sentiments of the president in her message. I too have been a long time resident and love this neighborhood. But lately, I see more and more eyesores.

The city passed a shopping cart ordinance last year. Yet I still see shopping carts abandoned here and there. What was the point of the ordinance if it is not being enforced in full? Are the police too overwhelmed to cite those they see on their way home with a shopping cart full of groceries and/or pushing children in them that are old enough walk? Or is it the case that they think it is not worth their time? Isn't a great deal of the city's budget spent on police and fire? What ever happened to commercial vehicles being illegal to park on the street? Yet, I see a tow truck regularly parked illegally on a highly visible street.

Perhaps what is needed is better communication with the police department and the city council on these and other issues. It might not be a bad idea to band with other neighborhood associations with common concerns to address such issues. Overcoming these challenges is achievable. There is power in a unified voice. In the end, we are voters.

Here is where you come in. There are only 7 households in our neighborhood that are active board members. We need you to step up and be more active in the neighborhood association. Code Enforcement Issues?

The other day, I received a call from a frustrated neighbor. The cause of his frustration was that one of his neighbors has neglected his front yard. The caller described litter scattered on the front lawn and said it was an ongoing problem. I advised him that this is a code enforcement issue. I also reminded him that the phone numbers for code enforcement are on the newsletter. I gave him the number and suggested he call our assigned code enforcement officer. I also called the officer and left a message for him. I realize that most people toss the newsletter after reading it, so they probably don't have these and other important phone numbers handy. Please take a moment to copy it down, post it on your refrigerator, or program it into your cell phone. I felt I should take this opportunity to remind all that the board does meet on a monthly basis. We will assist neighbors with their concerns. However, it is important that proper channels be observed. From our perspective, it may be helpful for code enforcement to receive calls from individual residents, apart from the board. The more the better. When you call, you must have an address, they will do nothing without this. Also, keep track of dates, times, and whom you spoke to. Follow up and ask for an update. If it appears that a reasonable amount of time has passed and your concern has not been addressed, ask for the supervisor. Also, let a board member know. We will get involved at this juncture.

Mail Tampering Warning

On Friday August 17, someone was tampering with the mail on Towner Street, north of Washington. Outgoing mail was removed from the mail boxes and the letters were ripped open. The damaged envelopes were placed in other neighbor's mail boxes. It is unclear whether it was simply a prank or if someone was truly up to no good. It is important for neighbors to keep a watchful eye out for any suspicious activity and notify authorities if anything seems unusual.

What Are Code Enforcement Issues?

Here is a brief list of what code enforcement issues are. For a more detailed list, go to www.ci.santa-ana.ca.us. Type in community preservation on the search menu.

- Porch/patio/balcony storage limited to plants, bbq and patio furniture.
- Occupancy of trailer/mobile home outside of approved park.
- Weed/grass in excess of 6 inches above grade.
- Accumulation of garbage/rubbish on premises.
- Inoperative vehicles are prohibited.
- Parking of vehicle/boat/trailer on grass
- Storage on yard, driveway
- Commercial Vehicles or supplies stored on premises.
- Landscaping not maintained.
- Wood surfaces not weather protected.
- Garage must be available and accessible for parking vehicles.
- Fence height for front yard no more than 3' on non arterial street, 4' for arterial street.
- Carport structure must be architecturally compatible with house.
- Clothesline or household fabrics visible from public street.

I am certain that you are aware of the current real estate market conditions. Many families bought homes with an adjustable rate mortgage and now that the rates have adjusted, they are facing foreclosure. Many lenders are nearly insolvent. Consequently, lenders have severely tightened their lending criteria.

" DID YOU KNOW ? "

- It is illegal to dispose of hazardous waste in personal or public trash cans and it is punishable by a \$25,000 fine.

- Trash barrels are not to be put out on Sunday before 4:00 PM and must be taken in by 12:00 midnight on Monday evening. Storing your trash barrels must not be visible from the street.

- Garage/Yard Sales are only allowed on the first weekend of March, June, September, and December, Saturday and Sunday only. Items must not be put out before 7:00 AM and taken in by 4:00 PM. No new merchandise is allowed to be sold. If there is rain on the first weekend the second weekend will be allowed.

- Cars are not to be parked on the lawn. Inoperable vehicles are not allowed on the street or in the driveways and cars can not remain in the street for more than 72 hours without being moved. Inoperable vehicles are vehicles that are either damaged, flat tires, and do not run.

- Front yard fences require a building permit and can not be over 30" high. Contact the building department 667-2700 for more information. The permits are free. Maintain your wood fences by keeping them painted and in good repair.
