Now here's a book that will help every reader, young or old, new to Lewis or very familiar, gain new insights into this amazing teacher and mentor. The book is easy to read, and will save you many years of studying Lewis on your own--check it out!

Dr. Clark has taught courses on the theology of C. S. Lewis for more than 30 years, and is currently professor of New Testament and Greek at Vanguard University in Costa Mesa. He earned his doctorate in Biblical Studies at the University of Notre Dame, and brings many insights into Lewis' writings.

# Springtime Spiff Ups

Following are some great suggestions to shake off those winter blues as we roll into another beautiful California Spring.

**Start at the front and spiff up the front door and entrance**--A fresh coat of paint on the front door, flowers and a groomed lawn is inviting and easy on the eye.

Crank up the curb appeal--Pull weeds, rake leaves and trim overgrown shrubs, especially if they block windows or the path to your front door.

Paint --A little paint goes a long way and for the price, you can't beat the effect it can have on home value. First, it's important to increase your curb appeal and a fresh coat of neutral paint will make your home appear larger, brighter and more appealing to your neighbors as well as potential buyers of you're looking to sell in the future. Second, inside rooms and the people who live in them always benefit from a freshening.

Make repairs--Fix things like leaky faucets and sticky cabinets, and replace old screens. They may seem insignificant, but minor repairs can increase the value of your home.

**Rearrange**--Make sure your furniture placement allows for safe, easy traffic flow and reflects the purpose of each room. If you have too much furniture, get rid of some.

**Sparkling Kitchen**--A clean and uncluttered kitchen is a staple of feng shui, good health and home staging. Sanitary work surfaces (use a teaspoon of bleach with water in a small spray bottle for tile counters, plastic cutting boards, etc.) are imperitive when preparing food for the family. Sanitize daily and after handling meat, poultry, game, or fish.

**Organize**--When your house is meticulously organized, you live a low stress life in your home. You also save time not looking for things when everything is in its place.

Deep Clean--Clean every inch of your house, and don't forget to make your windows and floors sparkle. If your carpet appears old and stained, think about replacing it. Also, make sure there are no offensive odors. You can purchase an air-neutralizing spray that will help remove odors without creating an overwhelming masking odor.

**Lighten up** --Lighten up your home with natural tones and a neutral dose of style.

Let the sun shine in, and turn on the lights where necessary. Open blinds or curtains duing the day tomake sure the house is well lit. You might find yourself happier.

Last year was an especially difficult year for homeowners, lending institutions, and those in the real estate industry. Although wise investors are starting to snap up bargains, banks are still reeling from the aftershocks. They are loosing their shirts on short sales and foreclosed properties. Second trust deeds are being completely wiped out.

A friend who works at the County of Orange in Human Recourses tells me they have hired many former realtors, loan officers and those who were processors, funders, etc. at mortgage companies. They were either laid off or couldn't earn a living. Everyone seems to know someone that has lost their home.

A friend told me that she and her husband are the only couple among their group of friends and relatives who bought homes around the same time that remain in their home. The others have all endured foreclosure. She's scared. I too have friends that are educated, honest, and hard working. Yet it happened to them.

The reasons for the current climate have long been explored in many publications. I won't beat a dead horse by discussing the role of lending institutions and their lack of common sense guidelines. So what can be learned from this? I have found a common denominator. What I have deduced from every story I've heard is the following: almost everyone was badly advised or represented.

People didn't understand that making a minimum payment out of four payment options, would cause the balance of the principal to grow. This is called negative amortization. Others didn't know their interest rate was just an introductory one and that it would soon adjust. Still others decided to pull cash out, because they could. I have heard a multitude of stories such as these. It is evident the breaching of fiduciary duty was rampant. Did they ask for references when they chose to do business with these so called professionals? Not one did. At least not anyone I've talked to.

The moral here is, don't trust just anyone with one of the biggest transactions of your life. After finding out what the client is trying to accomplish, a professional real estate consultant will lay out all of the options and make an advisement based on what is best for their client. Unless the Realtor or lender has been highly recommended by a trusted source, ask for references. Any professional should be able to provide them and should not be offended. If they are, move on.

Joe is a consummate professional and has a track record of response to us. He brings a depth of knowledge and his valuable years of experience in the field here in Santa Ana, and he will do his best to solve your problem.

### DID YOU KNOW?

- It is illegal to dispose of hazardous waste in personal or public trash cans and it is punishable by a \$25,000 fine. This includes motor oil, housepaint and other toxic substances.
- **Trash barrels** are not to be put out on Sunday before 4:00 PM and must be taken in by 12:00 midnight on Monday evening. Storing your trash barrels must not be visible from the street.
- **Garage/Yard Sales** are only allowed on the first weekend of March, June, September, and December, Saturday and Sunday only. Items must not be put out before 7:00 AM and taken in by 4:00 PM. No new merchandise is allowed to be sold.
- **Cars** are never to be parked on the lawn. Inoperable vehicles are not allowed on the street or in the driveways and cars can not remain in the street for more than 72 hours without being moved. Inoperable vehicles are vehicles that are either damaged, flat tires, and do not run.
- Front yard fences require a building permit and can not be over 30" high. The permits are free. Contact the building department 667-2700 for more information. Maintain your wood fences by keeping them painted and in good repair.



• Store Shopping Carts are a blight when left on the steet after they are stolen from stores. The solution? If this applies to you, please use your own folding shopping cart (pictured at left) instead of stealing them from stores to transport your purchases. It is expensive for the city to pick them up (\$75 each time) and you can buy your own for around \$10-25 at nearby stores. It's an investment in good neighbor relations.
