Almost 40 years ago when Mary Jane's peers were buying new cars and the hottest fashions, she started looking for a house to invest in. Even though her friends poopoo'd the idea at the time, she fell in love with, then bought an old rambling house which she's been enjoying ever since.



"All my friends thought I was crazy" she quips, "but it was one of the best decisions of my life." But Mary Jane is courageous by nature--she applied and was hired as the first female letter carrier in Newport Beach, paving the way


for all the hundreds of women mail carriers who have come after her.

There have been many changes to the property over the years as she was raising her daughter, Katie, in the home. Mary Jane's father, a builder, helped her along the way with the many thoughtful restoration projects, improvements and occasional repairs, of what is now the front house built in 1904. They preserved the original tripartate windows and front door, plus many other features of the home while still keeping it livable.

There's lots of great ways to save water and even the smallest things add up to big savings.

1. Our toilet doesn't leak. To make sure, put a few drops of food coloring in your toilet tank. If the coloring begins to appear in the bowl without flushing, you have a wasteful leak that should be repaired at once. 2. We don't use our toilet as a wastebasket. Flushing a used facial tissue down the toilet wastes about 2 gallons of water. 3. We have a toilet that uses only 1.6 gal. or less. All toilets sold after 1992 are required to use no more than 1.6 gallons per flush. New high efficiency toilets operate very well with even less water. If you have an older toilet, you may save from 2 to 4 gallons per flush by replacing it with a new model and be eligible for an incentive rebate or reward. Check www.bewaterwise.com for info. 4. We take quick showers. Limit your showers to the time it takes to soap up, wash down, and rinse off—3 to 5 minutes. 5. The adults turn off the water while shaving. Fill the sink with a few inches of water in which to rinse your razor instead of using running water. 6. Our bathroom faucets and pipes do not leak. 7. We have installed water saving shower heads. Run your shower into a bucket for 30 seconds. If more

than 1 ½ gallons (6 quarts) of water are in the bucket, you need a flow restrictor.

8. We take baths with shallow water.

A partially filled tub uses less water than all but the shortest showers.

9. We turn off the water while brushing our teeth.

Before brushing, wet your brush and fill a glass of water for rinsing your mouth.

A concern that's Doggin' on us...

Could there be a Security Breach at YOUR house?

It seems like there have been a lot of lost and/or found dogs of late in Washington Square.

For all of us who are dog owners, or owned by dogs, it might be time to walk the perimeter and check the security of your fencing to make sure your little Fido doesn't do a remake of Steve McQueen's "The Great Escape."

Based on the pictures of recent escapees, it appears most of the lost dogs are the smaller variety who can squeeze through those little exit opportunities that we humans overlook. So please take a close look around the yard and check out your fences, doors and gates to make sure they are secure and lock properly.

Santa Ana has a leash law that no longer permits dogs to run at large. Owners can be cited by police or animal control officers and and could be liable for a fine of \$100 for the first offense, up to \$1000 plus imprisonment for up to 6 months for multiple offenses.

Exact wording of the law is: "No dog shall be allowed to walk the public streets without being restrained by means

of a leash capable of restraining at least four times the weight of such dog."

Dog licenses are required by the city by city ordinance. All dogs must be dogs licensed which will help in getting Fido and Fifi back home to you if they take off on the lam0000. Check with the city's dog licensing department (714-647-5257) for more information. We have provided cost info below.

Please be a good neighbor and remember to remove all of your lost or found signs from the neighborhood when your dog returns home.

This also pertains to garage sale signs at the end of the garage sale weekends so as to

keep your Washington Square looking good and trash free.

Valid through June 2012. Subject to change after end of fiscal year.

LICENSE FEE

REGULAR (unaltered) EACH DOG \$100.00 PUPPY(between 4-6 mos.) EACH DOG \$24.00 SPAYED/NEUTERED* EACH DOG \$24.00 SENIOR CITIZEN** FIRST DOG \$12.00 REPLACEMENT TAG EACH DOG \$2.50 LATE FEE*** EACH DOG \$41.00

A Rabies Vaccination Certificate issued from a licensed veterinarian showing vaccination that will be valid for the entire licensing period is required.

- * To receive a discount rate for a spayed or neutered dog, you must enclose a copy of the sterility certificate or a signed statement of sterility from a licensed veterinarian.
- ** To receive the senior citizen discount rate, you must be 65 years of age or older (proof of age is required). One discount per household. Animal must be spayed/neutered.
- *** Your dog license and rabies vaccination should be obtained within (1 5) fifteen days after your dog reaches the age of (4) four months or after moving into the City of Santa Ana. Otherwise a LATE FEE will be assessed.

Smarty Plants--every bit as beautiful, not nearly as thirsty

Washington Square is a neighborhood that's known for our beautiful gardens and well kept front yards. Flowers bring a landscape to life so you might want to think about these native and California friendly plants. They thrive here because they're perfectly suited to our mild winters and warm, dry summers. The bonus is they require only moderate watering plus some are irresistible to hummingbirds.



Baby Blue Eyes

Nemophila hydrophyllaceae

With a charming name and abundant flowering and delicate ferny leaves. Blossoms range from white to light

blue to a striking blackish purple ringed with white. (Pennie Black variety).



Douglas Iris

Iris douglasiana

Easygoing and easygrowing, this iris is a native to California. Long a garden standby for beautiful spring blooms. There are as many as 300 specieies with varying water needs, appearance and blooming times.



Hummingbird Sage

Salvia spathacea

Everyone loves hummingbirds and this hardy, small clumping sage is a magnet for them because of its light, fruity aroma. It attracts hummingbird and human eyes wiwth its scalloped, textured leaves. and flower stems that rise above the leaves up to two to three feet.



More Home Water Use Survey Kitchen, Laundry and Outside

Check the items that show how your family uses water wisely.

KITCHEN & LAUNDRY
10. We use the dishwasher only for full loads. It uses less
water than washing by hand.
11. We use the washing machine only for full loads of laun-
dry.
12. We don't let the faucet run to clean vegetables. Rinse
vegetables in a sink partially filled with water.
13. We keep a container of drinking water in the refrigera-
tor.
Running tap water to cool it for drinking wastes water.
14. When we wash dishes by hand, we don't leave the water
running for rinsing. If you have two sinks, fill one with rinse
water. If you have only one sink, put your washed dishes in a
dish rack and rinse them quickly with a spray device or pan
of water.
15. Our kitchen and laundry room faucets and pipes do
not leak.
OUTSIDE
16. We water the lawn only when it needs it.
Step on your grass. If it springs back when you lift your foot,
it doesn't need water.
17. We water during the cool part of the day.
Early morning is better than dusk, since it helps prevent the
growth of fungus.

18. We deep soak our lawn. When you water your lawn, water
it long enough for the water to seep down to the roots where
it is needed. A light sprinkling, which sits on the surface, will
evaporate and be wasted.
*
19. We don't water the gutter. Position your sprinklers so the
water lands on your lawn or garden, not on concrete or other
paved areas. Also, avoid watering on windy days.
20. We've made our landscape California Friendly with trees
and plants naturally suited to our climate.
Many beautiful trees and plants thrive with little water in our
semiarid region.
21. We put a layer of mulch around trees and plants. Mulch
slows the evaporation of moisture.
22. We use a broom instead of a hose to clean driveways and
sidewalks.
23. We don't let the hose run while washing the car. Soap
down your car from a pail of soapy water. Use a hose only to
rinse it off.
24. The children do not play with the hose and sprinklers.
25. We have no leaks in pipes, hoses, faucets, and couplings.
Leaks outside the house can be extremely wasteful. To check for
hidden leaks in your pipes, make sure no water is being used
around the house and watch the water meter for 15 minutes.
If the meter shows some movement during that time, you defi-
nitely have a leak.

Update on SOS Committee activities:

Provided by the citywide Save Our Stadium Committee

The SOS / Willowick Committee, made up of 12 different neighborhoods, finally met with the Mayor regarding the pending move of a professional soccer team to Santa Ana Stadium. The Mayor indicated the Santa Ana Stadium, Eddie West Field (EWF), has been taken off the table but Willowick Golf Course (WGC) is still being considered. He was asked if he'd put that in writing and the committee now has a letter stating EWF is off the table and we understand copies were sent to Santa Ana Unified and Santa Ana College.

The committee was then told it is likely 2-3 years away when Chivas will need the golf course to build a temporary stadium at the site. This concerns the SOS Committee because if Chivas, after a year to two, decides the site is not feasible, Willowick is lost and all for naught. The SOS Committee is pleased that the stadium is no longer considered and claims it as a victory for their efforts. However, the committee members seriously question the proposed golf course location. The concerns are the traffic, noise, pollution, expense, etc. which will directly impact Santa Anita, Riverview West, and nearby neighborhoods so SOS is continuing to advocate the issue.

Two weeks after meeting with the Mayor, a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with Chivas USA was agendized at the September 19th council meeting regarding the Willowick site. SOS members attended the meeting with other residents and spoke against the proposed WGC location. SOS also believes by the Mayor placing the MOU on the agenda, he acknowledges and considers the SOS committee is serious.

Financial questions remain unanswered like: "With the City flirting with bankruptcy, where does the Mayor think the money will come from to build a multi million dollar complex; and then to finance the extensive expansion of the infrastructure to make such a facility accessible?" Until these questions are resolved, the SOS Committee remains committed to steer a project of this size to a more appropriate site, away from neighborhoods, closer to freeways, and save WGC from demolition for the good of its neighbors.

The Monarch Butterfly

Monarch Butterfly is a bird? Of course not, but a couple of younger W² residents said "buttrfly" when I asked them what bird we should talk about this issue. So I took them at their word. And why not? Butterflies are beautiful and fascinating. Plus they occupy the same airspace as our birds so for the first time in the history of the WSNA newsletter, we're giving them equal time and respect.

The Monarch Butterfly is perhaps the best known of all North American butterflies. The wings feature an easily recognizable orange and black pattern, with a wingspan of $3\frac{1}{2}$ —4 inches. The upper side of the wings is tawny-orange, the veins and margins are black, and in the border margins are two series of small white spots. The fore wings also have a few orange spots near the tip.

The underside of the Monarch is similar, but the tip of the fore wing and hind wing are yellow-brown instead of tawny-orange and the white spots are larger. Female Monarchs have darker veins on their wings, and the males have a spot called the "androconium" in the center of each hind wing from which pheromones are released. Males are also slightly larger.

Since the 19th century, Monarchs have been found in New Zealand, and in Australia since 1871 where it is called the Wanderer. In Europe it is resident in the Canary Islands, the Azores, and Madeira, and is found as an occasional migrant in Western Europe.

The Monarch is famous for its southward migration and northward return in summer from Canada to Mexico and Baja California and is the only butterfly which does so. Migrations are very long and no one butterfly makes the entire round trip. Females deposit eggs along the way so the migrations span the life of three to four generations of the butterfly. The length of these journeys exceeds the normal lifespan of most monarchs, which is less than two months for butterflies born in early summer.

By the end of October, the population east of the Rocky Mountains migrates to the sanctuaries of the Mariposa Monarca in the pine-oak forests in the Mexican states of Michoacán and México. The Western population (our Monarchs) overwinters in various sites in central coastal and southern California, United States, notably in Pacific Grove and Santa Cruz.

How the species manages to return to the same overwintering spots over a gap of several generations is still a subject of research; the flight patterns appear to be inherited, based on a combination of the position of the sun in the sky and a sun compass that depends upon a circadian clock that is based in their antennae.

Exciting new research has also shown that Monarch butterflies can use the earth's magnetic field for orientation. The antennae contain cryptochrome, a photoreceptor protein that is sensitive to the violet-blue part of the spectrum. In the presence of violet or blue light it can function as a chemical compass, which tells the animal if it is aligned with the earth's magnetic field.

Plant Milkweed!

and attract Monarch Butterflies to your garden!

At the moment populations of Monarchs are somewhat endangered due to unusual weather patterns-excessive rains and freezes in overwintering locations.

You can help by planting their beloved plant, milk-weed. Monarchs are very attracted to the plant where they lay eggs. The larvae then consume the plant and make their cocoon from which they eventually emerge as a beautiful Monarch Butterfly.

You can expect the larvae to pretty much defoliate the plant, but be assured it will grow back to feed another generation of butterflies.

Why do Monarchs love milkweed?

A female monarch lays its eggs on a sprouted milkweed plant. The eggs hatch in four to five days producing tiny yellow, black and white banded larvae (caterpillars). The caterpillars will feed solely on the

milkweed plant and they eat enormous quantities because they are growing fast.

They will grow to 2,700 times their original size in only two weeks, molting five times in the process. At three weeks old the caterpillar will enter the pupa stage and gradually change into an emerald green case ringed with golden dots called a chrysalis. Inside the chrysalis, the caterpillar rebuilds into an adult butterfly which, at five weeks old, climbs out of the chrysalis.

Its bright orange and black wings signal to predators, "Beware!" Why? Monarchs are what they eat! The milkweed's "milk" or white latex is both acidic and somewhat poisonous to many animals. Since a monarch caterpillar feeds solely on milkweed, it absorbs these substances into its body and stores them throughout its life. Therefore, the monarch tastes awful to many of its would be predators.



DID YOU KNOW?

It is illegal to dispose of hazardous waste in personal or public trash cans and it is punishable by a \$25,000 fine. This includes motor oil, housepaint and other toxic substances.

Trash containers are not to be put out on Sunday before 4:00 PM and must be taken in by 12:00 midnight Monday evening. Trash containers must be stored so they are not visible from the street.

- Garage/Yard Sales are only allowed on the first weekend of March, June, September, and December, Saturday and Sunday only. Items must not be put out before 7:00 AM and taken in by 4:00 PM. No new merchandise is allowed to be sold.
- Cars are never to be parked on the lawn. Inoperable vehicles are not allowed on the street or in driveways and cars cannot remain in the street for more than 72 hours without being moved. Inoperable vehicles are vehicles that are damaged, have flat tires, and/or do not run.
- Front yard fences require a building permit and can not be over 30" high. The permits are free. Contact the building department 667-2700 for more information. Maintain your wood fences by keeping them painted and in good repair.
- Store Shopping Carts are a blight when left on the street after they are stolen from stores. The solution? If this applies to you, please use your own folding shopping cart instead of stealing them from stores to transport your purchases. It is costly for the city to pick them up and comes out of our pockets.

Planning a fence? Did you know you need a permit to erect a fence around your property to control height and material requirements. Permits are free.
