Alton and Melanie had both grown up interested in performance art. Both had acted and Melanie had also danced. They met in 2002 at a Second City Improv Class and married in 2004. Their daughter Dagny is eight years old.

The Hitchcocks had a big new house in San Marcos but did not feel at home there. They wanted something with more diversity in terms of residents and architecture, something with a strong sense of community, near urban amenities, but with a small-town feel. Washington Square is just what they were looking for. Luckily Alton's real estate business is mostly in South Orange County.

Built in 1922, their home will be 100 years old in January, and looks like it was built this week! Within a scant 1004 square feet, there are three quite small bedrooms and 1 bath. The prior owner had completely remodeled the kitchen, removed interior walls, and created one large open space. This very modern open-concept interior is cleverly furnished with mid-century furniture to define the living and dining areas, and it works brilliantly. The garage has been dedicated to the brewing, bottling and canning equipment needed for Alton's seasonally brewed creations. His signature beers are given as gifts to clients and friends, and now to the WSNA Oktoberfest!

With no storage space in either the house or garage, a shed was built in the back yard. It is a unique structure with modern lines and colors. In front of the shed is a small deck/patio area for sitting, sipping, and snacking. A fire pit welcomes chilly evenings.

This year they tackled the exterior of the house, which had some serious deterioration issues. The wood siding painted by a prior owner was peeling due to improper prep work; an apron of original cedar shakes needed to be replaced with new ones; stucco needed repair; and an exterior section of the living room needed to be rebuilt. To say that the house was repainted is an understatement. Several workers spent MANY days removing paint down to the bare wood siding. They primed and painted it. They repaired the eaves and roof over the front porch. The ceiling above the porch was completely restored, refinished, and stained. It is just beautiful.

Mosquitoes with WEST NILE VIRUS!

ADVISORY: Mosquitoes with West Nile Virus in Santa Ana

Mosquitoes carrying **West Nile virus have been found in Santa Ana**, according to the Orange County Mosquito and Vector Control District. Now more than ever it is important to check your outdoor spaces for standing water to prevent mosquitoes from breeding and spreading this disease.

Mosquitoes breed in even tiny amounts of standing water, such as in plant saucers, bowls, cups, fountains, tires, barrels, vases, and other containers. Take precautions outdoors and wear mosquito repellent when mosquitoes are most active (at dawn or dusk.)



Remember: Tip, Toss + Take Action!

- Tip standing water weekly
- Toss unneeded containers
- Take action + apply repellent to exposed skin when outdoors

Spotlight on *BOBI KEENAN!*



Bobi Keenan came to California from Chicago in 1964. (Despite being in California for over 50 years, I can still hear her Chicago accent and delight in it.) Bobi studied nursing at Golden West College and after receiving her RN, she worked at UCI Medical Center, Fountain Valley Hospital, Stanford University, and Cornell U Medical Center in New York City. She worked on medical floors, and everywhere else but the ER and the ICU. Her skills were such that an anesthesiologist once told the nursing staff, “Call Bobi Keenan, she can put an IV in a grape vein.”

It was in the fall of 1988 while working at Stanford University, during the HIV/AIDS epidemic when she spent her first night working with an AIDS patient. He had lots of friends in his room. As his health began to deteriorate, the patient’s mother acknowledged that she knew her son was gay; his father didn’t know, and he would have disowned him if he had known. At one point, Bobi entered this patient’s room the night before he was scheduled for surgery. She found them all asleep, his mother cradling her son’s lover in her arms “like the Pieta”. At Stanford they treated lots of AIDS patients, that came from San Francisco who were gay, but climbing the corporate ladder. To stay on it, they needed to remain in the closet. In the beginning, everyone was young and very sick and likely to suffer from additional infections due to their weakened immune systems. It was here that Bobi found her calling – clinical research – specifically HIV/AIDS research.



Back at UCI in 1990, and for the next 20 years, she served as a Clinical Research Nurse in the School of Medicine’s Division of Infectious Diseases and was a member of the California Collaborative Treatment Group which planned and implemented clinical trials for HIV/AIDS. With UCSD at the helm, UCI, USC, and sometimes other Universities, worked together and did ground-breaking work. Some lives were saved, and others were prolonged until effective HIV treatments were developed. Bobi states, “When I joined in 1990, they had just finished evaluating a more effective, less toxic treatment for Pneumocystis Pneumonia. It remains the “Gold-Standard” for therapy to this day. Nobody died of HIV; what killed people were unusual infections their immune systems could no longer deal with. Most of our work was focused on those areas. I was privileged to coauthor papers published in the Journal of AIDS and JAMA about our findings”.

Reflecting on these early days of AIDS, she believes that the clinical trial **participants** were the unselfish, unsung heroes of the AIDS epidemic. They kept their research appointments, even when they were very sick or even dying. They knew the treatments might not benefit them, but they wanted to help the ones who came after. It was the only legacy they had to leave behind.

Bobi has lived in Washington Square since 1992 and has been an active part of the community, served on the WSNA Board, and has participated in many neighborhood events. She admits that “Infectious diseases are her hobby”, but now her time is also taken up with gardening, two writers’ groups, and an enduring love for art, museums, and UCI theatre. She is still a member of The Art Institute of Chicago. She even has a miniature Chartres Cathedral Labyrinth in her backyard! Her neighbors love her and swear that she makes the best guacamole and banana bread!

Three years later, he is doing great, but wishes he still lived in the neighborhood, so he comes and visits often. He watched his home be rebuilt and now watches as new owners make it their own. Richard loves Washington Square because of "the street trees, the atmosphere and the neighbors, even the dogs and cats."

Richard now lives only three miles away just north of the 22 Freeway on LaVeta. He enjoyed his recent visit on yard sale weekend and commented that he met some really nice new neighbors. He had lunch at El Pico de Gallo restaurant, a favorite place to eat. They treat Richard like royalty as he used to eat there daily.

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The Square is Going to the DOGS

Meet Rock

Rock is a four-year-old retired greyhound racer. At 85 pounds, he is not the largest of greyhounds! He was recently rescued in Woodinville, Washington by Jason and Amelie Tiritilli, who chose Rock because of his playful personality. The rescue had described Rock as "wild" and the first day home he was nonstop - inspecting everything, playing fetch, opening doors with lever handles, and just testing his new boundaries. Once that was out of his system, he settled into typical greyhound behavior, sleeping 17-18 hours a day. Now his favorite things are love, food, and his red squeaky ball! His weight must be maintained precisely for his health, and you will notice that he has the tall, slender, and elegant stature of his breed. He appears bony, but that's a good thing!

Recently Jason, a mechanical engineer in aerospace manufacturing, and Amelie, a Fellow at UCI Medical Center... and Rock... were staying with Maureen and Terry Tiritilli. Maureen will tell you that greyhounds are the sweetest, calmest dogs ever, and that is why Jason has had three: first Bentley, then Koki, both unfortunately deceased. Rock and Koki actually raced against each other in Florida.

Rock was a pleasure to meet. Did we mention the sweetest?

Facts about greyhounds:

Racing and greyhounds go hand in hand, as greyhounds run up to 45 mph (the second fastest land animals, behind cheetahs). They typically stay with their mamas until training begins at one year of age. Their racing careers begin at 1 ½ years of age and they retire between 2 and 4 years, depending on their success at the track. They are treated very well at most tracks to ensure their health and speed. There are various opinions about greyhound racing, but that is a whole other story entirely.

Currently there are only four states which allow dog racing: Iowa, Arkansas, West Virginia, and Texas. Florida outlawed racing in 2010. Agua Caliente racetrack in Tijuana is the last greyhound racing location in Mexico.

Unlike many of us who have scent hounds, Greyhounds are sight hounds and, as a result, have a very strong prey drive. This means that as an owner you can never walk them off leash, because they might get sidetracked and run after somebody's little Fluffy. They are also very sensitive dogs... you can't yell at them, or they will get their feelings hurt and sulk. Although they don't require much exercise, Jason says they get bored easily and can be stubborn. Also, they don't lick people and have very little odor.

Greyhounds are often seen doing therapy dog work and are considered the best greeters in the dog kingdom, with a welcoming "ROO" instead of a woof. Rock, however, neither woofs nor roos! (Several years ago, I was pet sitting for a friend's greyhound. She would sleep with her legs up against the wall. All went well until the first time I heard her ROO... in my ear... in the middle of the night. Sigh... it was time to go potty.)

Southern California is one of the primary suppliers of rescued greyhounds in the US due to its proximity to Tijuana, and there are a handful of rescue organizations in Orange County. If you decide to adopt a retired greyhound, you will be happy you did!

Southern California sunshine and fertile soil by planting more and more unusual plants. Eventually their corner house became known as the "Jungle House." Richard, who wanted to clean up the yard because he felt it looked like Jurassic Park, was told to let nature do its thing. So, Richard chose another path; he could be seen on many streets with his green trash bin on wheels, his broom and his dustpan, cleaning sidewalks and gutters around the Square, always with a warm smile and a welcoming greeting.

With his civic mindedness, Richard was a poll worker in our precinct for over 30 years, attended neighborhood meetings, provided electricity for a WSNA street party at 10th and Olive streets, hosted a dumpster day site, did campaign work for Reagan, Nixon, and Ford, and he still saves newspapers and recyclables for a neighbor. This summer, Richard volunteered with me at the Orange County Fair, selling honey in the OC

Beekeepers Assn. booth. He is committed to helping due to his very giving nature.

Although born in Burbank, Richard spent most of his life in Orange County. He graduated from El Modena High School in Orange and was a dedicated employee in food service for over 30 years at Fairview Development Center. An earlier job had him rubbing elbows with Hollywood celebrities in an addiction rehabilitation facility. Coincidentally, after moving into our neighborhood he met a co-worker who lived only five homes away. Small world.

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Did You KNOW? part 2

The **DID YOU KNOW?** article in the October 2020 newsletter (featured Astronaut Gerald Carr) got me thinking of other notable Washington Square residents. The following is a partial list.

Wade Herrin: 1970s. Santa Ana Mayor (1505 N. Baker St.)

John Garthe: 1970-80s. Santa Ana Mayor and Fire Chief 1950s – 1970s. The water facility on Bristol at Santiago Creek is named after him. (1104 Freeman St.)

Dan Griset: 1980s. Santa Ana Mayor. Involved in establishing the Neighborhood Movement in the City. (1111 N. Towner St.)

Bomo Koral: (Yes, there was a person by the name Bomo Koral) Prominent baseball player at SA H.S. and player for the Santa Ana Stars in the 1920s and WWII vet. Worked for the City Parks & Rec. and developed the park systems, thus Bomo Koral Park on MacArthur is named after him (1615 N. Louise St. - house is no longer there).

Reverend Perry Schrock: First Congregational Church Pastor. Leader in the 1920s fight against the KKK and led the elimination of the local Klan. (1104 N. Westwood Ave.)

James Musick: Orange County Sheriff. 1947–1975. The Musick jail in Irvine is named after him. (1606 N. Louise St.)

Eddie Martin: Aviator pioneer and started Martin Aviation at John Wayne Airport. (932 N. Louise St.)

Adeline Walker: Founder of Santa Ana Historical Preservation Society and led the charge to save Dr. Howe Waffle House Museum. (919 N. Olive St.)

Ronald Crookshank: Superior Court Judge. (1020 N. Lowell St.)

Jim Sleeper: Orange County Historian and author. (1108 Freeman St.)

Ralph Bill Cole: Long time football coach Santa Ana College 1950s. (1005 N. Towner St.)

John Ward: Santa Ana College football coach. (925 N. Towner.)

Robert Farrar: Santa Ana High School Principal 1950s – 60s. (1307 N. Lowell St.)

Rob Marshall: Formed the American surf band, the Chantays in 1961 with five SA H.S. I friends in his garage at 1421 Towner producing the musical hit “Pipeline” and other popular surfing hits.

David “Elsewhere” Bernal: A famous “Illusionary” dancer in the early/mid 2000s whose videos went viral. Traveled internationally performing and became dance coach to Michael Jackson. Performed in commercials and on Tonight Show. (Freeman St.)

Courtney Conologue: Two-time runner up in surfing World Title 2015 & 2016. In August 2020, along with her brother Ryan, paddled from Catalina Island to Huntington Beach to raise funds for Feeding America and A Better Chance. (Lowell St.)
