
Fall is here and the kids are back in school. As residents of Washington Square, (WS), we know to be extra careful when driving in the Square during the peak hours of kids coming and going from school. With all the parked cars on Washington from non-WS residents, the risk of an accident has greatly increased forcing the WSNA Board to take action.

The Board is currently working with the City to return Washington Street to a street where residents can park and put their trash containers in front of their homes and lessen the litter created by non-residents who park in WS. One avenue to achieve this is by establishing permit parking. The residents living on Washington between Towner and Westwood are pursuing this. The residents on 15th between Towner and Westwood are exploring the permit parking option. Also, please take a look at the new red curbs at Towner/Washington and Westwood/15th. These red curbs make the intersections much safer for drivers and pedestrians. We will keep you updated as we find solutions to making WS safer for all of us.

Susan van der Roest, WSNA board member and committee chair for the traffic/parking issues, has been working with the residents of Baker Street for solutions to resolve the parking/drop-off/pick-up congestion at the end of Baker St. near Heroes Elementary School. The NO drop off/pick up on Baker St. agreement between the Santa Ana Unified School District and WSNA is currently not enforced.

Our next two events coming up in October are the Neighborhood Clean-up scheduled for Saturday, October 10th at 9am, and our highly anticipated Oktoberfest scheduled for Saturday, October 17th! Bristol Street Widening Update

On September 3rd the City held a meeting at Heroes school to update the community on the status of Bristol Street widening. Phase IIIA from Civic Center to Washington is underway with ongoing property aquisition and design. The streets on the West side of Bristol will be converted to cul-de-sacs when construction begins in March of 2017 and is expected to last 12 months. Phase IIIB from Washington to 17th is also in property acquisiton mode as evidenced by the houses being torn down. No timetable for starting construction was given.

Parking Permits

For our streets with permit parking, the 2015 permits expire on October 31st. Beginning on October 1st the City will mail those with current permits renewal information. The cost is \$62.79 for each permit with a maximum of three per household. Guest permits are free if you live on a permitted street and choose not to purchase a sticker. While stickers & permits are mailed when you renew, you have to pick up guest permits in person at the Public Works Agency counter if you don't pay for a sticker. Bring proof of residence. Here Comes El Niño

Californians are all well aware that there is a weather pattern, usually promising rain for our dry state, known as "El Niño". What many of us don't know is where the term comes from. This warm surface countercurrent flowing down the coasts of Ecuador and Peru around Christmas time was discovered in 1975 by local fishermen and christened "El Niño", a reference to the Christ child, in honor of the season during which it occurs. And according to weather experts, the conditions are ripe for the arrival of a potentially record-breaking El Niño this winter. Forecasters warn that the current El Niño building in the Eastern Pacific, AKA "Bruce Lee" after the martial arts star, has the potential to be more powerful than any in the past 65 years and likely to surpass the last "Godzilla" El Niño of 1997-1998.

According to Mike Halpert, deputy director of the Climate Prediction Centre for the National Oceanic and AtmosphericAdministration (NOAA) this El Niño "could be among the strongest El Niños in the historical record." NOAA reports indicate that there is currently a greater than 90% chance that this year's El Niño will continue through the Northern Hemisphere this winter and an approximate 85% chance that it will continue into the early spring of 2016.

A powerful El Niño will have a global impact. Governments around the world are monitoring the growing El Niño indicators with concern. The effects of another "Godzilla" El Niño could include drought conditions in Australia and Southeast Asia as well as warmer overall world-wide temperatures, exacerbating the already steady rise in global warming. The 1997-98 El Niño took an estimated 23,000 lives and caused \$45 billion in damage world-wide. While a strong El Niño could be a boon to drought-stricken California, it could also have serious side effects in the state, such as massive landslides and flooding. During the last "Godzilla" El Niño, devastating storms generated by it killed 17 people in California and caused \$550 million in damage. For those of us in Washington Square, mudslides aren't likely to be a problem. However, flooding is a possibility. A glance at a flood plain map of the area shows that many parts of Santa Ana are in flood plains and Washington Square, while not right in the middle of one, is not far off.

So, what can you do to prepare? The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) suggests the following 5 things you can do now:

- Check your property. Clear drains, rain gutters and downspouts of debris;
- Get flood insurance. If you already have it, check your policy to make sure you have enough coverage;
- Make copies of all your important documents and make sure the originals are stored safely some where outside of your home (like a safe deposit box);
- Take photos of your possessions (furniture, collectibles, electronics) and store the pictures along with your important documents outside of your home;
- Make an itemized list of clothes, books and small appliances and other possessions, and start saving receipts when you purchase items so you'll have proof of their original cost.

And, as always here in The Square, we can look out for each other and lend a hand to our neighbors should the need arise.

Richard and Tracey Conlogue have lived in Washington Square for over 25 years and have served as WSNA board members and block reps for South Towner. They have three children, one of which is currently ranked #1 in the World Surf League (WSL) Women's Championship Tour from Santa Ana! Courtney is 23 years old and brings a unique blend of ability, drive and athleticism to the elite WSL Women's Championship Tour, attributes that make her a legitimate world title contender in the most exciting era in pro surfing history. While known for marathon surf sessions and a training regime that could rival a professional athlete, Courtney is much more than just strength and endurance which pays testament to her deep ocean knowledge and finesse under pressure.

Born into a passionate surfing family, Courtney learned to surf on a family vacation in Mexico, where her father pushed her into a few waves on a bodyboard at the tender age of four. At five, Courtney had found her feet on a surfboard, quickly rising to the top of the National Scholastic Surfing Association (NSSA), winning almost every event she entered to seal her title as a national amateur champion. In 2006, Courtney shot onto the world stage, stepping up to the challenge of some of the biggest and heaviest surf ever seen in ASP Women's World Title competition and riding waves in excess of 15 feet at Honolua Bay, Maui (Hawaii) as a 14-year-old wildcard. Courtney set out on a global campaign to qualify for the ASP World Tour, juggling exams and school commitments with ASP Qualifying events, finishing the year ranked World No. 3 and qualifying for the elite 2011 ASP Women's World Championship Tour. Her accomplishments since then are too numerous to mention in this article.

Courtney's trajectory toward achieving her career goals, guided and mentored by her Mom and coach Tracey, are not the only thing that makes her impressive. Using her positive image and fan following to support good causes, Courtney's philanthropy is just as important in how she defines herself as a sports person and role model. Whether championing the underdog through positive messages, or inspiring the next generation to achieve their own dreams, as Courtney goes about her journey towards her ultimate goal of becoming California's first Women's World Champion in over three decades, fans all over the world go with her. 9 Our Garden; Our Labor of Love

I grew up with fruit trees all around me. Fragrant fresh mint was always outside the kitchen door ready to be snapped up for salad or tea. From colorful blossoms, to sweet fruits and nourishing vegetables, each season delivered a new feast for the eyes, mouth, and soul.

As I contemplated buying a house, I had few requirements about its size and configuration, but I knew it must have a garden. Prior to moving to Washington Square in 2009, I lived in various apartments for twenty five years. Although I tried to nurture various plants, I killed even the most hearty (rosemary). I'm happy to report my brown thumb is evolving into a greener one. I have several fruit trees and a vegetable garden that are interspersed between California native plants.

I still have much to learn, and that is why I'm starting this column. I hope it will open a conversation between the experienced and the novice gardeners among us. We can share stories and tips on growing a sanctuary while being water wise and chemical free where possible.

As I prepared to write this article, I thought of the many ways we use our backyard space. To some, it's a playground for the kids; to others, it's an organic farm; sometimes it's a space to entertain family and friends; and others times we might think of it simply as a respite from the work day - a place to enjoy a glass of wine while watching birds and butterflies flutter about. In most cases, it's a multi-use space; and in each case, we hope to make the most of our space.

Fall is upon us so enjoy persimmons, avocados, and various citrus fruit harvests. Don't forget to admire the changing colors and add fallen

Dear Washington Square Neighbors:

As we head into the last quarter of 2015, and look back on the last 9 months, we have seen about a 10% increase in prices from the 1st four months of the year to the last 4 months. The average price of a typical home in Washington Square during the period of Jan-April was \$480,800. From May through through mid-September the average price rocketed to \$528,700. (What a huge change from the same period in 2009, when the average WS home was in the low \$300s!) There are many factors for this huge increase--a strong jobs market, a lack of good inventory, and low interest rates.

What I have noticed over the last 4 years is that homeowners are less likely to sell their residence unless they have a huge change in circumstances--for example: marriage, a new baby, retirement or change in job circumstance. Although there are a few flip homes on the market, long gone are the sellers who are selling just for the sake of "moving up." This stability is excellent for our wonderful neighborhood.

However, because of the good economy and interest rates still at 3.75-4.25%, there are a lot of new hopeful homeowners coming into the market place, and so, housing prices continue to climb.

Pumpkin Cheesecake Squares

MAKES 10 bars

CRUST

1 cup all-purpose flour
3/4 cup packed dark brown sugar
1/2t salt
1/2 cup (1 stick) chilled unsalted butter diced
1 cup pecan halves (about 4 ounces)
3/4 cup old-fashioned oats

FILLING

1 8-ounce package cream cheese room temperature

3/4 cup canned pure, pumpkin

1/2 cup sugar

1 large egg

1/4 cup maple syrupy

1 1/2t ground cinnamon

1t ground ginger

1/2t allspice

TOPPING

1 cup sour cream

2 tablespoons sugar

1/4t vanilla extract

CRUST: Preheat oven to 350°F. Generously butter 9x9x2-inch metal baking pan. In a food processor pulse - flour, brown sugar, salt and butter until it looks like a course meal, add pecans until evenly chopped. Add oats, pulse until mixture is moistened but not clumping. Press 3 1/2 cups crumbs into the prepared pan and press until the mixture is firm. Bake crust until golden in the center of oven for about 30 minutes. Remove from oven and cool for 5 minutes, save for later. Transfer the balance of the crumbs to a baking sheet, Bake crumbs until golden, stirring once, about 12 minutes. Cool crumbs.

FILLING: In the same Food processor add all the ingredients until smooth. Spread filling over crust; bake until set, dry in center, about 20 minutes.

TOPPING: Mix all ingredients in a small bowl. Spread evenly over hot filling. Return to oven and bake until topping sets and bubbles at edges, about 5 minutes. Cool completely in pan. Sprinkle remaining crumbs over topping; gently press into topping. Cover; chill until cold .about 2 hours. Cut into squares. Can be made 2 days ahead or frozen for several weeks.

HOUSEHOLD TIPS

- ** To make your refrigerator work more efficiently, give it a cleaning once every three months. This is easy enough to do by removing the bottom vent, which on most units, just pulls off to expose the refrigeration grid. You can buy a long handle rat tail type brush from your local hardware store made just for this purpose to reach in and pull away the lint that closes the grid making it harder for it to breathe. If you own a cat or dog you may want to do this once a month.
- ★ Squeaky door hinges? Tap up the hinge pin bit and put a drop of 3-In-One oil and tap down on the pin. Plus, this will make your doors swing much easier, especially in our older homes. You can also loosen up your dead bolts by spraying a little WD-40 in the key slot.
