neighborhood clean, visible with the city and fun for the residents. Contributions are at the following level:



UNLOCKING THE PAST



Do you like History?

The Santa Ana Public Library is offering a free 1 – 2 hour class on how to research the history

of our homes and our neighborhood.

The Santa Ana History Room would like to offer a workshop, "Unlocking the Past: Keys to developing a house history". During the workshop, History Room staff will show how to use the interesting resources available at the library, answer questions and provide time to get started on the research. Keeping the Peace (and quiet) In Washington Square

Did you know that the City of Santa Ana has a noise ordinance? In order to control unnecessary, excessive and annoying sounds, the City Council adopted an ordinance in 1978 to prohibit specified noises in residential areas. Noises that exceed 55 decibels from 7:00 am to 10:00 pm, or 50 decibels from 10:00 pm to 7:00 am, are subject to time limits ranging from zero to thirty minutes depending on the decibel level. Noises at these levels are detrimental to the public health, welfare and safety, and residents are encouraged to be considerate of their neighbors when playing music or operating noisy equipment.

Additionally, the Santa Ana Municipal Code prohibits loud and raucous noise from sound making or amplifying devices. This ordinance is in force at all times of day or night and at any public or private location within the City. If you have a question about the limits, or would like to make a complaint about noise, please call the Santa Ana Police Department at 834-4211.

And neighbors, be courteous with your dogs barking too. We all deserve a good nights sleep!

SQUARE MEALS

Recipes courtesy of Washington Square Residents

Fabulous American Apple Pie

1 - 9" Pie Shell
Filling
6 cups sliced Golden Delicious Apples
1/2 c. Sugar
3 T. Flour
1 t. Cinnamon
1/8 t. Salt

Topping

1 c. Brown Sugar1/2 c. Flour1/2 c. Oatmeal1/2 c. Butter

Mix filling and fill pie shell. Mix topping and sprinkle on top of apples. Bake in pre-heated oven at 375 degrees with foil around edges of crust for 25 minutes, remove foil and bake another 25-30 minutes or until apples are done.

Remove from oven and sprinkle top with: 1/2 cup Pecan Pieces and 1/2 c. Caramel Ice Cream Topping. Cool and serve.

In The Garden with Carolyn

Proper Rose Pruning ensures biggest and best flowers.

Proper pruning not only keeps roses shapely, it can encourage bigger and better blooms. Before you begin to prune you should learn what kind of rose you have and how and when it should be pruned.

There are many broad categories of roses. Some include ground cover, miniature, shrub, bush, tree and climbers. Climbing roses, for example can be ramblers, pillars, hybrid teas, or old fashion antiques . If you are not sure what type of rose you have, bring a sample to your local garden store.

Most roses here in Orange County can be pruned before new growth begins in spring. Mid to late January is the best time. Don't neglect to check your pruning tools before you begin.

Remove dead and diseased or crossing branches. Cut back to healthy white wood.

Cut back the old growth. Remove canes that are 3-4 years old. These will be gray, brown or black and will produce

few, if any flowers. Then cut back one year old (green wood) and two year old (greenish-brown wood) canes. Cut them down at least 2/3 their heights, at an angle, just above a bud.

Check for suckers. These will be canes growing below the bud union, from the rootstock. If any are found, dig down and tear– don't cut them from the stem or root. Seal all cuts with pruning tar and spray the stems and soil around them with a rose care product to help control diseases. Mulch with 2-3 inches of bumper crop

and feed them regularly with a good rose care food. Trim roses year-round, cutting them well below the fading flowers.

Water your roses as the weather dictates. The top two inches should become dry between waterings.

Add Value To Your Home Without Spending A lot.



Home improvements don't have to be costly. There are many easy improvements you can

make to your home without spending a lot of money.

Attention to basics can still offer you a good return on your investment. One of the most important things when selling your home is showing that your home has been carefully maintained. This alone could help you get the price you want. Your kitchen and appliances should be sparkling clean and in working order. Bathrooms also need to be spotless, re-grout where necessary. Replace plumbing or lighting fixtures that look worn or are outdated. Clean up your garage and strap your water heater to the new codes. GFCI (Ground Fault Circuit Interrupters) should be installed in kitchen and bathroom electrical outlets or any electrical outlet that is near water, and should all be working properly. Most buyers will find cracked glass or leaking seals in dual pan windows unacceptable, so replace if necessary.

The most cost-effective and profitable improvement you can make is paint. Paint the interior walls a neutral color and the ceilings white to make rooms appear bigger. Replace the carpet and/or flooring if needed. Shabby floors can kill a sale. An attractive yard will also boost the value of any property. Clean the deck or patio and decorate with potted plants and flowers. Manicure your yard and if you have automatic sprinklers make sure they are in working condition. Cosmetic changes do not have to be expensive. If everything in your home is working properly and looks like it has been well cared for, your home will be appealing to prospective buyers.

Now that's A Bright Idea!

White Vinegar - used originally for pickling, you can use this household agent for cleaning salt-stained leather and suede shoes. Make a solution of equal parts of white vinegar and water. Dab it onto a cotton rag, rub gently over the entire shoe, then let dry. You can now step through slush without fear of ruining your favorite boots.

Wire Hanger - used widely for hanging clothes, this handy item can now be used to remove static cling. Run the long side of a wire hanger over your skirt, and between your skirt and panty hose or slip.

Oil - Not only for frying...you can use it for removing adhesive from glass. Apply cooking oil to the sticker using a paper towel or a soft cloth, rub firmly, then rinse with warm, soapy water. (If the adhesive if stubborn, use a dap of toothpaste along with the oil.)

Greeting Cards - Cut out hearts, flowers, or any other whimsical illustration form the card's cover and use as gift tags. Make sure there is no writing on the opposite side. Store with your ribbons and paper.
